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1. Jointly Developed Expectations and Objectives

The District and committee parents will jointly develop effective, expectations and objectives for parental and family engagement by providing strategies to support partnerships among schools, parents and families, and the community to improve student achievement. The district Parent & Family Engagement Committee and Action Team will provide input to support the development of the parent and family engagement policy and district and school improvement plans for state and federal compliance. The committee/action team will utilize the Johns Hopkins University National Network of Partnership Schools (NNPS) model to enhance parent participation and engagement in the school and community. The district and schools will utilize the six types of engagement: parenting, communication, volunteering, student learning, decision making and community collaboration and other programs (i.e. Family Leadership, Inc.) may be provided to shape parent and family leaders through workshops to build and increase positive relationships between the parent, child, school, and community.

The District will provide and assist parents with support and opportunities to submit comments regarding unsatisfactory implementation of the district and school plans. The comments will be submitted to the Arkansas Department of Education.

Objectives and strategies for reaching the goal:

1. Continue to implement parental and family engagement policy and activities as well as disseminate information to the community to promote parental and family engagement throughout the District, i.e. social media, Parent Link/Blackboard, LRSD TV, LRSD Handbook, Schoology, etc.
2. Conduct an annual spring meeting with Parent Engagement Committee/Action Team to update policy for the next year's Title I, Part A program, school improvement and District parent engagement. (May –June 2022)
3. Involve parents and families of children served in Title I, Part A schools in decisions about how the required "set-aside" of Title I, Part A funds will be used to support parent and family engagement activities. The committee will ensure that not less than 90% of the one percent requirement goes directly to the schools.
4. Coordinate parental and family engagement activities with those of other programs (i.e. Parent Teacher Association (PTA); early childhood; State education departments; ESOL, college and career education, health and wellness, mental health, safety, homeless, student services, alternative education, LRSD health clinics, community and district after-school programs). TYPE 6 Collaborating with the Community: Coordinate resources and services from the community for families, students, and the school, and provide services to the community.
